The Guam Council on the Arts and Humanities [CAHA] was created by Public Law 16-122 as Guam's state arts agency. CAHA is charged with administering federal and local monies in support of the arts in Guam. Its role is to ensure that the arts in the community will grow and play a more significant part in the welfare and educational experience of our residents. With a small staff and limited resources, CAHA remains actively engaged in the arts and maintains a presence in the community. Whether it be through CAHA initiatives or through its collaborations with the public or private sector in the community, the arts and culture are thriving in Guam. The people of Guam are impacted through the arts by outreach programs, cultural events and activities, artistic-presentations, workshops, forums and seminars, displays, exhibitions and shows supported by CAHA.

Our Performance - CAHA PROGRAMS

Grants Program: *CAHA awarded in grants totaling \$86*,000.00 in *FY 2022* to individuals and organizations for projects in various artistic disciplines encompassing folk arts (3), media arts (2), special projects (2), visual arts (2), with emphasis placed on programs that benefit the underserved community (2). Grant and fellowship awards supported projects such as apprenticeships, arts instruction and presentations in schools, musical and theatre productions, podcasts, recordings and video documentation, literary works and publications, cultural and art events and contemporary and traditional art exhibitions. Following are projects and programs that received funding from CAHA in FY 2020.





Art-in-Public Places a.k.a. Percent for the Arts: Enacted in 1979 through Public Law 15-50, the Art in Public Places Program also known as the Percent for the Arts was strengthened through amendments made through P.L. 20-27 (1989), P.L 31-118 (2011) and P.L. 33-235 (2017). Guam's Percent for the Arts Program targets both Public and Non-Public Development Projects supported by either federal or Government of Guam funds or are recipients of Qualifying Certificates (QC) tax rebates, incentives, loans guarantees, bond financing or other subsidy arrangement. The law applies to public building and facilities and non-public buildings where total cost of construction, remodeling or renovation, exceeds the sum of \$100,000. The purpose of the program is to foster culture, arts and the development of local artists and that a portion of appropriations for capital expenditures be set aside for the acquisition of works of art for public and non-public buildings and facilities. P.L. 31-118 expanded the program to include the nurturing and development of young children through the arts, while P.L. 33-235 expanded it to include other artistic disciplines in addition to visual arts. CAHA established the rules and regulations for the selection of art works and ensures that open competition of



The CAHA Art Gallery is a venue for local artists, organizations and schools to exhibit and showcase their arts, offering the people of Guam an opportunity to experience and enjoy their creativity. Seven exhibits were held in FY 2022: 2 solo exhibits and 5 group showings. The gallery is located in the heart of Hagåtña on the second floor of the DNA Building.



The **CAHA Art Bank Program** plays a major role in supporting and promoting visual, traditional, and contemporary artists through the exhibition of their artwork which increases the public's awareness and appreciation for the arts. CAHA has approximately **380** art pieces in its collection in various mediums: acrylic, watercolor, oil, batik, wood carvings, and ceramics in two and three dimensional works. These pieces are loaned to government agencies on an annual rotating basis for exhibition and display in their respective facilities.

Our Performance (continued)

The CAHA Artist Directory is a resource for students, the community and CAHA constituents and is produced on an biannual basis. The directory contains names, and contact information of local artsist and the various disciplines they represent, as well as arts and culture organizations. There are 350 artists and organizations listed in the directory. Hard copies of the directory are available at CAHA upon request and can be downloaded from the CAHA website at www.guamcaha.org.

Pubic and Private Partnerships: CAHA partners with government entities such as the Guam Visitors Bureau, Guam Department of Education, University of Guam, Department of CHamoru Affairs, as well as, village mayors and non-profit organizations to ensure that all citizens have the opportunity to participate and experience activities that incorporate arts or culture in their events. CAHA also collaborates with businesses, financial institutions, and hotels to showcase art work and traveling exhibitions in their establishments such as the Guam Micronesia Island Fair, the Annual Silbrasion Mes CHamoru and the Sirena Festival to name a few.

Creative Aging Workshop: Artists, creatives, and representatives from organizations that provide services to the manamko (elderly adults) attended a Creative Aging Workshop at the CAHA Gallery on September 15, 2022. The workshop centered on five core areas: (1) the value of traditional and contemporary arts for promoting health and wellness, (2) the role of cultural values, traditional hierarchies and communication styles in teaching, (3) the effects of aging in Pacific populations and significance in the delivery of art programs, (4) the design of sequential, skill based activities for manamko n both virtual and face-to-face platforms, and (5) the foundation of community partnerships, intergenerational dynamics and social engagement on Guam. The objective is to have a program that will enrich the lives of older adults through arts education.

FY 2022 American Rescue Plan (ARP) Grants Awarded: In FY 2022, CAHA awarded 14 grants totaling \$123,700 of American Rescue Plan (ARP) monies from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to 9 individuals/creatives who were financially affected by the COVID19 pandemic and to 5 nonprofit organizations that had planned arts and cultural programs for FY 2021 and were experiencing financial hardship due to the pandemic. ARP grants were awarded in various artistic disciplines including Arts-in-Education (1), Folk Arts (3), Media Arts (3), Performing Arts (2), Special Projects (3) and Visual Arts (2).
